### HELD FOR OFFENSE.

R. C. Endicott and Claude Noster Bridge, Are Accused.

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., Nov. 12.—On complaint of Game Warden Tab Reason C. Endicott and Claude Noster of Bridge were brought before Justice of the Peace E. A. Dodge Saturday charged with having in possession or killing deer out of season. It appearing that the prosecution was not ready for trial the case was continued until Wednesday. At that time the accused and witnesses again appeared and were examined by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney A. Liljeqvist, who dismissed the charges against them and turned the matter over to the next grand jury for action. Mr. and Mrs. Jeffrey and baby will thus be compelled to make three long trips on the case the parents being witnesses. On the same day the men were accused of having or killing deer they had killed a bear, and in fact have devoted considerable time to hunting varmints, having killed 9 panthers and numbers of wild cats and bears in the past two years. It is therefore thought by some that they have contributed more largely to the protection of deer than to their slaughter.

### BUYS COAL LAND.

California Men Secure Coquille Valley Tracts.

The Coquille Sentinel says: An important coal land deal was consummated here this week whereby the properties of Geo. E. Pike, J. L. Kronenberg and others was sold to R. E. Doan and H. B. Guthery of Los Angeles, representing California and eastern investors.

The properties transferred are the best in the county both in quality as well as extent of the coal measures. It is the intention of the purchasers to begin immediate development and will start sinking a double compartment shaft at once. Wharf and bunker facilities have been secured on the Coquille River, at a point where shipment can be easily made to all coast points on the Pacific. The opening of the shaft will be only 400 feet from the waterfront.

Mr. Doan, who is a coal mine manager of many years experience, will remain here and direct the operation of the property and the mine will be brought into production just as soon as it is possible to accomplish it.
