Railroad Clerk Who Saved Laborer in Chicago Seven Years Ago Located in Arizona.

CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 12.—Henry P. McCoy, railroad clerk, formerly in the Chicago and Alton offices in Chicago, now in Southern Pacific offices at Tucson, Ariz., has been awarded a Carnegie medal and a \$1,000 prize for rescuing a workman from a gas filled well in Chicago seven years ago. The Carnegie committee traced McCoy through Lordburg, N. M., Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland, Seattle, Honolulu, and Shanghai to Tucson.
