The contests are on Winesap, Splizenburg, Rome Beauty, Wagener, McIntosh Red, Jonathan, Yellow Newton and mixed cars of any standard commercial varieties. The first prize in each competition is \$250, the second being \$100. Carload entries are eligible in the sweepstake event, in which the first prize is \$1,000 and the championship banner. The second prize is \$300 and a silver medal banner.

The Chicago Association of Commerce will award its \$500 trophy cup to the exhibitor of the car scoring highest on pack, and the International Apple Shippers' Association will present a silver trophy to the best commercial carload.

Eleven cars of other exhibits, including a large number of 10, five, four and single box entries and 36 district displays from Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia, will arrive this week, making an exposition of 32 cars, or about 2,016,000 apples, in competitions for prizes of a total value of \$20,000.

SLOW RETURN ON MEASURES

State Prohibition Beaten By 13,000 While Home Rule Carries By About 3,000

Official returns show that two more dry counties voted wet under the local option law last Tuesday, making seven in all lost this year by the dry column. The last counties reporting on this question were Gilliam and Tillamook. Gilliam is wet by a vote of 433 to 316 and Tillamook has gone wet by more than 300.

Confirmation was received on the report that the dry side has gained Coos county, but in addition to Tillamook and Gilliam it has lost Polk, Morrow, Klamath, Umatilla and Malheur.

Tax Amendments All Lose.
All three of the proposed tax amendments to the constitution have been defeated, according to the incomplete returns. The initiative amendment giving each county the right to regulate taxation within its borders received a larger vote than did either of the amendments proposed by the legislature. The county tax measure is behind about 2,000 votes in a total of 58,000. The first tax amendment on the ballot list (308, yes; 309, no) is behind 2200 in a total of 53,000; and the second tax amendment (312, yes; 313, no) is behind 7,400 in a total of 50,000.

The good roads amendment has received a handsome majority. The favorable vote now exceeds the negative vote on the amendment by about nearly 7,000 in a total of 50,000 counted. It is indicated that the amendment has carried by about 10,000 majority.
The county bill, providing a local method for creating new counties is defeated. The majority against the bill is 3,100 in a total of 53,000 votes counted. This vote indicates that the total majority against the bill will be about 4,500. All of the County Division bills were beaten.

Results Boiled Down.
Dallas county went wet after two years of dryness.
Josephine county went dry by 12 votes. It will be contested.
Umatilla county and Pendleton went wet at the recent election after two years of drouth.
Prohibition carried in Lane county by 300. Home Rule had a majority of 900 against it.
