WASHINGTON WOMEN WIN.

OREGON women can find consolation for the defeat of the woman suffrage amendment in this state in the magnificent victory which the women in their sister state of Washington won.

After a fight lasting many years they have won a vote upon all public questions in Washington by the adoption of a woman's suffrage amendment to the constitution of that state.

There are now five states in which the right of women to the ballot on all issues is recognized—Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Idaho and Washington. In these commonwealths women are no longer classed with criminals, minors, idiots, insane, and Indians when it comes to voting, but their womanhood is given the same recognition as manhood by the electoral laws.

This list of victories is short, but it was as far back as 1869 that Wyoming led off; Colorado followed in 1893, and Utah and Idaho in 1896. Since then there have been smaller victories in the way of a vote on school and bond questions in some twenty-nine or thirty states, but for fourteen years every effort of women to secure full suffrage in new states failed. Fourteen years between victories is a long time, but the women are not discouraged. They are not fighting the fight for this generation of women, especially, but for future generations of women. It does not matter so much to them, therefore, if fourteen years do elapse between victories so long as their movement keeps moving along toward ultimate success.

And the woman suffrage movement is moving toward ultimate success. Men may deny women full suffrage today, but they will not do it much longer. Women in this country have been voteless longer in the past than they will be in the future, and they know it. That is why they keep fighting away so patiently, so hopefully and so resolutely, even when long years elapse between great victories.

THANKSGIVING DAY PROCLAMATIONS.

By President William H. Taft.

"This year of 1910 is drawing to a close. The records of population and harvests, which are the index of progress, show vigorous national growth and the health and prosperity well being of our communities throughout this land and in our possessions beyond the sea. These blessings have not descended upon us in restricted measure, but overflow and abound. They are the blessings and bounty of God.

"We continue to be at peace with the rest of the world. In all essential matters our relations with other peoples are harmonious, with an ever-growing reality of friendliness and depth of recognition of mutual dependence. It is especially to be

noted that during the past year great progress has been achieved in the cause of arbitration and the peaceful settlement of international disputes.

"Now, therefore, I, William Howard Taft, President of the United States of America, in accordance with the wise custom of the civil magistrates since the first settlements in this land, and with the rule established from the foundation of this government, do appoint Thursday, Nov. 24, 1910, as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, enjoying the people upon that day to meet in their churches for the praise of Almighty God and to return heartfelt thanks to Him for all His goodness and loving kindness."
