**Goes to Hospital.**—Harry Wrinkler, the popular clerk at the "Busy Corner" will enter Mercy hospital at North Bend this evening to undergo a minor operation there tomorrow. His many friends will hope for his early recovery.

**Cousin Dead.**—Alex Campbell has been advised of the death of his cousin, W. H. Carroll, which occurred at Roseburg last week. Mr. Carroll was quite well-known on Coos Bay and the friends here will regret his early demise, for he was only 35 years old.

**Invent Propeller.**—Max Timmerman has applied for a patent on a new style of propeller. Instead of the style in general use, he has devised one modelled like an augur which gives more surface to the wheel and consequently more power. While it will not do for speed boats, he claims it will be a great thing for towing.

**Rebuild Florence.**—The tug, L. Roscoe, is here from the Siuslaw, having towed out the Hugh Hogan and brought a cargo of salmon here for reshipment. Frank Fox, formerly of Coos Bay, is now chief engineer on the Roscoe. He reports that the burned portion of Florence will be rapidly rebuilt. The run of salmon in the Siuslaw was the largest in years.

**Weds in California.**—Rocco Biasca, the well-known Coos River rancher, returned yesterday from a three months stay in California, bringing with him a bride and surprising his friends. On November 5, he and Miss Palmira Signorotti were married at Santa Cruz, Cal. They will reside on his Coos River ranch and his many friends on the Bay will unite in wishing him and his bride success and happiness.

**For State Position.**—T. J. Thrift, Coos county assessor, is circulating a petition to Governor-elect West asking his appointment as a member of the Oregon State Tax Commission

**RETURN LETTERS SOONER.**

**Five-Day Rule Adopted For Uncalled For Mail In Future.**  
 Hereafter letters received by any first, second or third class postoffice in the United States will be held, in case of non-delivery, only five days, unless the address of the sender, with some other specified period of time, is written on the envelope. A general order to this effect has been issued by the Postmaster General, in accordance with an act passed by congress last June. Heretofore undelivered letters, without any return limit written or printed on the envelope, have been held in the post-office for 30 days, and have been a source of much unnecessary labor. Such letters have been thumbed over by mail clerks many times a day. Under the new law, the work of the department will be reduced one third.
