JAIL FOR DEALING IN BAD EGGS

Two Commission Merchants Sentenced In Philadelphia. PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 19.—The first jail sentence imposed under a recent act of the legislature for selling eggs unfit for food was passed by Judge Barratt in the quarter sessions court here when he sentenced George D. Ellis, a Water street commission merchant, to three months in the county jail. Thomas D. Ellis was fined \$500 and the costs of the prosecution. Abraham Staples, another egg dealer, who, Special Agent Cassidy, of the state dairy and pure food commission said, "made a practice of buying up decayed eggs and shipping them to New York bakers," was also sentenced to three months in the county jail.
