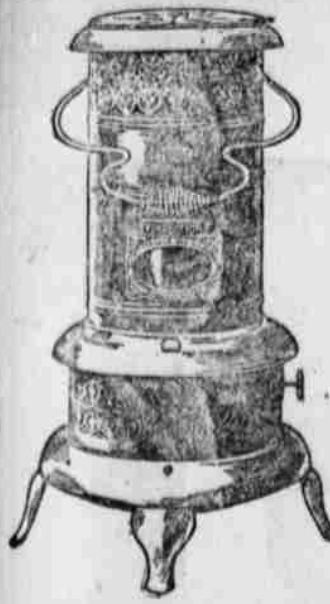

Report cards were given out Wednesday.

The Central school club has a somewhat different assortment consisting of The Pathfinder, Journal of Education, Normal Instructor, Primary Plans, Oregon Teachers' Monthly. Other subscriptions are ordered but not received yet.

The German Club met Thursday evening with Miss Montgomery. The instruction of the evening centered around The Life Work of Bismark, and the German Legislature. The club has recently purchased song books containing German music to be used at its meetings.
