

DEVELOPMENT OF COOS BAY

R. A. Copple in a short talk said that one great need of Coos Bay was more cooperation in working for its advancement.

J. D. Goss said that while the advancement of Coos Bay in some lines had not been as rapid as was hoped for, still everybody had faith in it and he believed this would ultimately be rewarded.

Prof. Hewitt said that the younger men were willing and anxious to take hold and make the fight for development along the lines the older men had started.

Hugh McLain compared Coos Bay with the other sections of Oregon, most of which he had recently visited, and he said that while they had only one, Coos Bay had many and this was bound to ultimately bring what all hoped for.

W. S. McFarland made a short farewell speech, saying that business developments necessitated that he should leave Coos Bay. He said he regretted it very much but that in the future he would still be a Coos Bay booster and try and assist the country as he had done during his residence here.

J. V. Smeaton made a short talk paying tribute to this section.

Urges United Effort.

C. F. McKnight made a short and able plea for united effort and cooperation in boosting Coos Bay. He said that the Chamber of Commerce was the best medium for doing this and that every man interested in the welfare of Marshfield should unite in it.

C. A. Smith warmly seconded this and said that the amount of good the Chamber of Commerce could do depended on the number enlisted in its work and the amount contributed to carry on the work. He said everybody should assist in it. He then started the circulation of subscription lists for membership, his company heading the list with \$40 per month.

Enlarge Committee.

W. S. McFarland had previously suggested that the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce be

increased to twenty to make it more effective. He said he had talked with many and this was the consensus of opinion. Upon motion, the meeting adopted this suggestion as a motion. Then J. W. Bennett moved that a list of names presented by Mr. McFarland be elected as the committee if the meeting had the power to elect or if it did not that they be recommended to the Chamber of Commerce for election.
