FAIL TO SCORE IN GAME HERE

Muddy Field Detracts From High School Football Contest Yesterday.

North Bend and Marshfield high school football teams played a tie game on the Marshfield depot grounds yesterday afternoon, neither being able to score. The field was very muddy, so muddy in fact that fast playing was impossible. A crowd of over 300 witnessed the game.

Most of the time, the ball was in North Bend's territory and once within about two yards of the North Bend goal but Marshfield could not force it over. Considerable punting was resorted to, the heavy field making it impossible for either side to make long runs.

North Bend showed considerable improvement since the two previous games with Marshfield but the condition of the field yesterday was such that the actual ability of either team could not be judged.

Sidney Clarke, one of Marshfield's best players, was put out of the game early by an accident, being knocked unconscious. He was not seriously injured, though.

Will Chandler was umpire, Hartman of North Bend, referee, and McDonour of North Bend, field judge.

The lineups yesterday were the same practically as in previous games.
