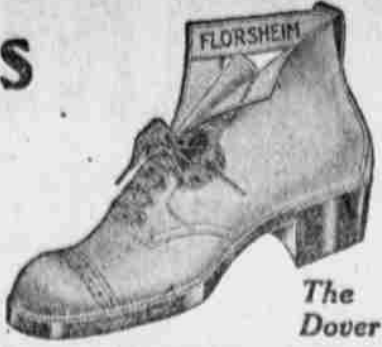

A death toll was imposed at Torreón where one thousand revolutionists with armed modern guns swept the city for several hours.
