Council Tuesday.—The Marshfield city council will meet Tuesday evening to take up various city matters. The North Front street paving will probably come up for consideration, a month having elapsed since notice of intention was declared.

May Build Brick.—The Wm. Noble estate is figuring on erecting a brick block at the corner of Third and Central avenue. The block will be erected early next spring. It is said, if the present negotiations with a prospective tenant can be closed.

After Wayward Girls.—Constable Cox and Marshal Carter Saturday evening went to Ferndale and brought back two young girls who were visiting a couple of boys in a cabin there. The matter may be taken up in juvenile court before Judge Hall.

Elks Memorial.—Marshfield Lodge of Elks, No. 1160, will hold their annual memorial exercises at the lodgerooms in the Masonic Opera House next Sunday. The services will be open to the public. The full program for the "Lodge of Sorrow" will be announced in a day or two.

Interest in Show.—Plans for the Coos Pet and Poultry Association's show which will be held in the Alliance building on the waterfront near Central avenue, December 8 and 9, are nearly completed. Great interest in it is being manifested throughout this section and it promises to be even better than the promoters had first hoped for.

Dredge Oregon Moves.—The dredge Oregon which has been working on the Lone Tree shoal in the lower Bay tomorrow will move up the Bay to the shoal opposite Ferndale and start cutting the channel down the Bay from there. Despite the inclement weather and storms, the Oregon has cut about 11,000 yards off the Lone Tree shoal. Although the work is not done, the uncertainty of the weather has led them to plan to come up the Bay where the storms will not bother so much. The new project will require about a month's work and then they probably will start in on the channel in front of Marshfield.

ANSWERS GARRISON'S STATEMENT.

Editor Coos Bay Times:
In your paper of the 25th, there is an article purporting to be Garrison's statement of how his confession was obtained. If Garrison got that off, he had a tutor who did some pretty good coaching. The object seems to be to slur Mr. Carter and Mr. Graham. I don't believe either of the gentlemen did what Garrison claims, but if they did I say it was commendable rather than otherwise. In these days of smart attorneys, insanity pleas, and technicalities, an officer has got to resort to extreme measures to bring a criminal to justice at all. For instance, in this case, the defense put on Jack Flanagan who testified that Garrison was of unsound mind, and the reason he thought so was because Garrison was a clam digger and wore a stiff hat, and Jack said it just like he meant it too. Another witness swore Garrison was crazy because he sold the witness 50 cents worth of rubber and forgot to get his pay. I claim that when three attorneys try to clear a man of cold blooded murder like this one was, with evidence like that, the "third degree" or any other old degree is too good for the criminal. At the time Mr. Carter and Mr. Graham were trying to get the confession, the body had not been found. If it had never been found, Garrison would have been turned loose and he repeatedly made threats he would get some of the witnesses against him who live at Sumner. Instead of criticizing the officers, the people of Coos Bay ought to give them a vote of thanks.

One more remark and I am through. Quite a number of people now-a-days object to capital punishment in any case. In a state where there is no capital punishment and a man of Garrison's type is sent up for murder and gets life sentence, he knows that is all they can do to him. Now, while he is in the pen if he should get it in for a fellow prisoner, or a prison warden, he knows they cannot do any more to him than they have done, he will kill them the first chance he gets, so I say "an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth," and do it as quickly and quickly as possible.
