THE POULTRY INDUSTRY.

A YEAR ago, through the suggestion of the Portland Y. M. C. A., the Junior Poultry Association of that city was organized for the purpose of arousing some interest in the work of raising poultry among the school children there. The Oregon Agricultural College and experiment station was appealed to for assistance and James Dryden, of the poultry husbandry department of the institution, lent his aid to carry the proposition to a successful ending at the conclusion of the following twelfth month from the time that the work was inaugurated, it being a part of the extension work of the college which is trying to instill a greater spirit among the younger class of townspeople to give more attention to agricultural pursuits.

A chicken contest was proposed in which as many children as felt so inclined could participate. Quite a number enlisted in the task. Cash premiums were offered for the best flocks and for the best progress made during the year, the first being \$100 and the second \$50, besides several minor prizes. The contest closed recently and the awarding of the prizes was made by Dr. James Withycombe, director of the experiment station, who is always ready to do all he possibly can to promote the interest in agriculture throughout the state.

Some excellent results were obtained in the contest. An egg yield of 152 eggs per hen was secured in one instance, and the average of the yards awarded prizes was 110 eggs per hen, which is considerably more than the average secured by the farmers of the state in general. The average net profit per hen was \$2.48 (net profit, remember), which is also an excellent showing as there is not one hen in a thousand on the farms of Oregon that produces that much gross. Any person can readily see that there is a promising field for the poultry industry upon the farms and that the remuneration is very satisfactory when the industry is conducted on strictly business principles and every hen made to do her best during her life, and when she is thus incited then sent to market and her place taken by newer and more prolific stock.

Each year one hundred carloads of eggs are brought into Oregon from the states beyond the Rockies and from California, and it seems almost ridiculous to think that such a condition exists in a state where conditions are so highly favorable for producing eggs and poultry.

The coming poultry show is important in directing attention to the possibilities in Coos county for this industry.

GET GOOD ROADS.

BY A VOTE of 25,001 to 17,531 Wayne county, Wisconsin, voted to bond itself for \$2,000,000 to build good roads. By a large majority, the people of California voted to bond that state for \$18,000,000 for good roads.

By a large majority the people of Oregon voted to enlarge the constitutional debt limit of \$50,000, for the purpose of building good roads.

The effect of these and other similar measures ordered by the people

is significant and important, industrially and commercially.

A good highway induces increased traffic, of all sorts. It increases the price of land, and production; also, indirectly but surely, education, intelligence, fraternity, and good citizenship.

Many facts and figures have been published that show that good roads into and through a producing country pay. They pay immediately and directly, but they also pay indirectly.

Oregon people should and will keep up the fight for good roads throughout all its many splendidly productive sections.—Portland Journal.

OPENS NEW QUESTION.

Oregon Tax Amendment Raises Peculiar Problem.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 30.—That the new tax amendment governing taxation by the people of counties will open an entirely new constitutional question in relation to the initiative and referendum which probably will be taken to the Supreme Court, and that this measure is an opening tax, but toward depriving the legislature of its power completely, are questions which are being discussed generally here by attorneys.

A more careful dissection of the amendment and its various phases has also brought out some further statements from Attorney-General Crawford as to the workings of the amendment.

As the amendment is sweeping and revolutionary in its tendencies and covers the widest field in taxation ever attempted by the state, the Attorney General is still somewhat reticent to commit himself finally on all sides of the measure.

He is confident, however, that the county commissioners will have no immediate power to act in relation to taxation in counties, although they may possibly be empowered by the people to do so at some later date. It is also practically certain that the proclamation of the governor declaring this amendment in force will not give counties immediate jurisdiction. While he believes that counties are not restricted because of the phrase "subject to any general law to be hereafter enacted by the people," he is of the opinion the wording of the amendment which provides that the people of the counties shall have control of taxation and exemptions puts it squarely up to the people and results in restraining them from taking any action until the next general election, as they are not empowered to vote on initiative measures of this nature save at general elections.

The Attorney-General also states that the legislature may pass as many bills as it desires relative to taxation, but these bills cannot become laws unless they are referred to a vote of the people at the following general election and approved by the electorate. The clause relative to restrictions in the constitution relieves all subsequent legislation from the restrictions which provide that taxation shall be equal and uniform. This means that the people of the counties or of the state may tax any particular class of property to the extent they please and the constitutional restrictions relative to "equal and uniform taxation" will have no effect, whether such taxation bills come from legislative assemblies or through initiative petitions.

The Attorney-General is of the opinion that this new act will have no effect on special revenues. He draws a distinction between taxing and licensing powers and holds that the legislature is not in any way deprived of power of licensing corporations which the legislature has under its control.

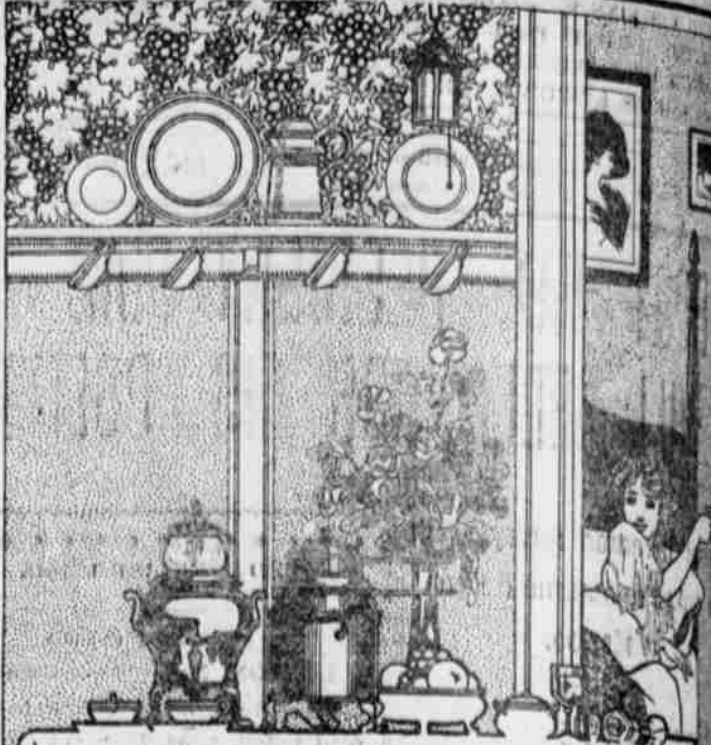
