## DAIRY MEN MEET.

Coquille Valley Association Holds Session at Coquille.

The Coquille Valley Dairy Association met in special session in this city on Wednesday, the meeting being made a joint session of the Association and the Farmers Cooperative Union. Both organizations were well represented at meeting, over fifty-five being in attendance at one time during the morning.

With relation to the election of a delegate to represent the organization at the Dairy Convention at Eugene, F. F. Eddy and M. M. Graham were placed in nomination as delegate and P. S. Robinson as alternate. The vote resulted in the election of Mr. Eddy.

After the luncheon had been disposed of other small matters pertaining to the business of the association were discussed after which the association listened to a few remarks by County Judge Hall on the value of good roads to the county and a short dissertation on the methods and the workings of the new county bonding road bill which was made a law at the recent election.

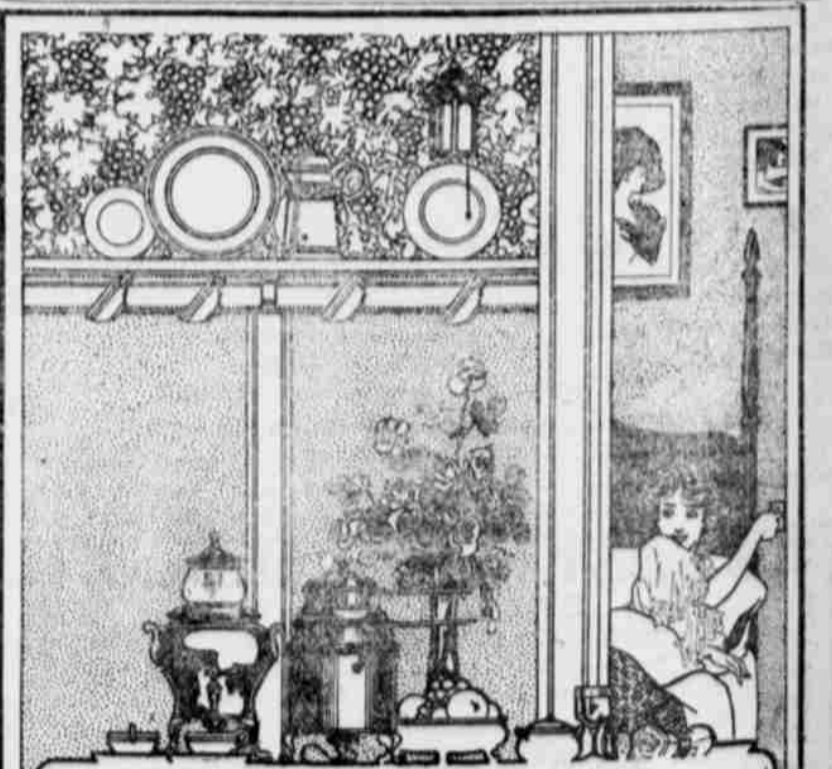
