Witness My Hand.
In the early days only a few scholars knew how to write. Afterward the seal was introduced as a substitute for the hand mark and was used with the words above quoted, the two forming the signature. CASE IS DISMISSED.

One of Government's Suits Against Smith & Kribs.
The Portland Journal says: "One of the civil land fraud suits against Frederick Kribs, C. A. Smith and Nels Werner, brought by the United States in 1908 to cancel the title to timber lands held by a number of defendants, was dismissed by United States Judges Wolverton, upon request of District Attorney McCourt Authority had been received by Mr. McCourt from the Attorney-General to ask that the case be dismissed for lack of sufficient evidence.

This case was one of a series of three, Smith being made leading defendant in one of the other two and Werner in the third. The three suits covered the same ground practically, and were filed upon telegraphic instructions from the Attorney-General so as to have them in court before expiration of the time allowed under the statute of limitations. The case had been set for trial next April.
