MOTHER'S AND TEACHER'S CLUB

IN THESE modern days of the making of clubs, like books, there is no end. The latest suggested for Marshfield is a Mothers' and Teachers' Club. If properly conducted, there is a place for such an organization. It should be made one of helpful mutual cooperation, however, rather than a rigidly ruled social conference. It should be modeled along the lines suggested by Prof. Tiedeman in his interesting and purposeful little talk at a recent banquet. That is one of mutual interest and sympathy.

When you start the boys and girls to school they go out of your immediate eye and keeping for mere of their waking hours than they are under it. For five-sixths of the school year you are entrusting these tender beings, so easily stamped by every impression, very largely to the guidance and direction of men and women who are strange to you and placing them under environments not of your own making.

Have you thought of that? Have you thought, too, that you are letting these precious boys and girls go out thus from under your watchful care for all of the formative period of their lives—the period when their beings unfold and their unknown mysterious selves are brought forth to the light?

You first send them away from home at the tender age of 5, or 6, or 7; they never come back to you as they were, nor to remain with you alone, nor to be under your guidance solely; they go on to school year after year, until they reach the age of 17 or 18; even then they do not come back to you for long, they go out again to college, perhaps, or

into the world to make a fight for a place for themselves.

Who are the men and women to whom you give your boys and girls for all these years.

Have you thought of them? Have you considered how you may be helpful to them?

They need your help, you know that your own boy and girl are a problem to you, who have known them from infancy; how much more of a problem they are to the teachers, who have to deal with forty, sometimes fifty, more like them.

Have you considered how you may encourage the teachers? They need your encouragement and sympathy. You find yourself perplexed and often wearied with the care of your own boy and girl, how much more perplexed and wearied are the teachers, with forty and fifty to guide and direct? Discouragements sometimes come without end, and trials and weariness and exhaustion—you can hardly understand how they bear down upon and depress the teacher.

Your whole duty is not done unless you give both help and encouragement to the teachers. So let them have a place in your sympathies and in your thoughts and if you are, remember them, too, with something of the spirit of these words by Walter Rauschenbusch from "A Prayer for All Teachers":

We implore thy blessing, O God, on all the men and women who teach the children and youth of our nation, for into their hands we daily commit the dearest that we have. We know that they are the potent friends and helpers of our homes, and that as they make our children, so shall future years see them. Grant them an abiding consciousness that they are co-workers with thee, thou great teacher of humanity, and that thou hast charged them with the holy duty of bringing forth from the budding life of the young the mysterious store of character and ability which thou hast hidden in them. Teach them to reverence the young lives, clean and plastic, which have newly come from thee, and so realize that generations still unborn shall see their shafts or else to higher levels through their wisdom and faithfulness. Gird them for their task with a double measure of thy patience and tranquility with a great fatherly and motherly love for the young, and with special tenderness for the backward and afflicted. Save them from physical exhaustion, from loneliness, and discouragement, from the numbness of routine, and from all bitterness of heart.
