

HIGH SCHOOL IS ACCREDITED

Supt. Tiedgen Takes Matter Up With Western Educational Institutions.

Superintendent Tiedgen of the Marshfield public schools, is taking steps to have the Marshfield high school put on the accredited list of the principal colleges and universities of the coast. He is in receipt of the following self explanatory replies to his letters:

Oregon Agricultural College.
Your letter of recent date in regard to catalogue and accrediting of your school was referred to me for reply. My absence for a week in attendance on the session of the Eastern Division of the Oregon State Teachers' Association held at LaGrande is responsible for the delay. Under separate cover, I take pleasure in sending you copy of the catalogue; also some forms for record of high school credits of students applying for admission to the college. Under our regulations, as you will see in the catalogue, your school is fully accredited. Practically all the subjects given in your eleventh and twelfth years will be accepted for advanced or college standing. As a matter of fact, however, most of our courses are so technical, that it is impossible to give a high school graduate better than Freshman rank, or at most Sophomore. A strong student (H. S. Grade) can usually complete the college course in three years. One who comes with the advantage of instruction in manual training, including drawing, elementary agriculture or domestic science and art, is naturally better fitted to enter our courses and can advance faster. During the year, we shall publish a manual of suggestive industrial courses, which will be mailed to all school men in the state. In the meantime, the college will be glad to assist you in any way possible, and to cooperate with you in your ambition to standardize your school.

Your favor of November 10th is at hand.
In reply I would say that the Marshfield High School is an accredited high school at the University of Oregon. This means that graduates from the four year's course at Marshfield High School are given entrance to the University without examination. However, every student before admission to the University must fill out one of our reg-

ular admission blanks on which is stated the different subjects and the amount of work taken in each, which he has completed in his preparatory school.

In general, I would say that admission to the University is based upon the completion of the regular four year's state high school course. I am sending you under separate cover a copy of the catalogue in which the whole matter is fully explained. I am also enclosing several of our application blanks for admission for you to keep on file.

We have appreciated receiving the students whom you have already sent us from Marshfield. They are doing very well indeed in the University.

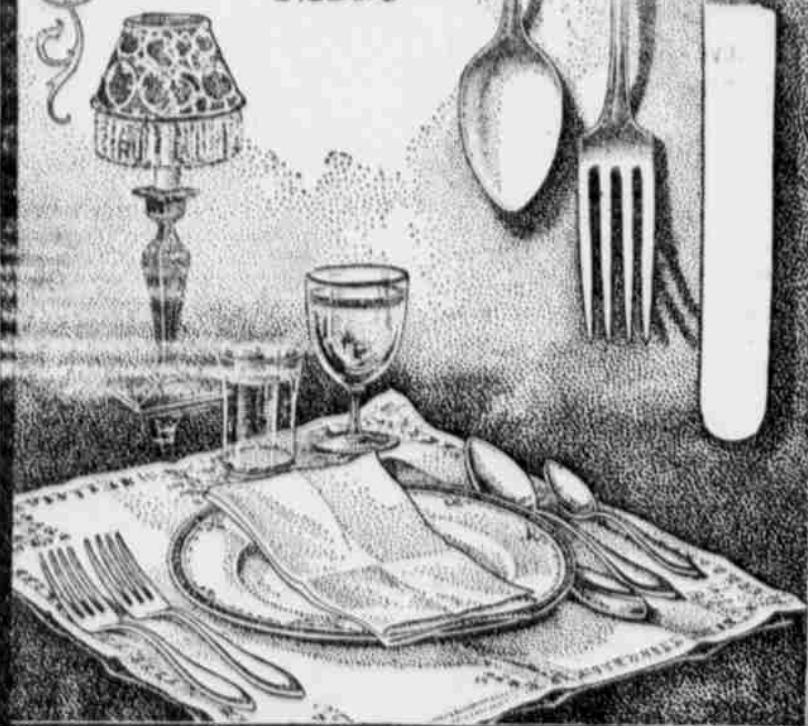
