**FIRE AT SUTHERLIN.**  
F. B. Waite's Town Sustains Loss of \$21,000.  
ROSEBURG, Ore., Dec. 9. — The little town of Sutherline, fifteen miles north of Roseburg on the main line of the Southern Pacific railroad, was visited by the most disastrous fire in its history shortly after 3 o'clock Tuesday morning, when the row of structures on the right leading east from the depot, burned to the ground. The total loss is said to be in the neighborhood of \$21,000, covered by about \$10,000 insurance.
