 Special Prizes Awarded Exhibitors of Chickens and Pets.

The first annual exhibition of the Coos Poultry and Pet Association closed today after proving remarkably successful and making a fine showing of birds and pets.

The association wishes to especially thank the merchants of Marshfield for their public spirited interest as shown by their contributions of money and merchandise, also Mayor Simpson of North Bend for donating the necessary lumber and the "Coos Bay Times" for their build theaters and opera houses, but largely endow central musical societies. To this stage America has hardly yet attained, although perhaps there is no nation on the earth more universally musical than this. In Marshfield, there are a number of musical organizations but the principal one is the Chaminade Club which only divides honors with the Coos Bay Band. The club is planning its annual concert which is to be given next Wednesday and should be largely and liberally patronized.

The Chamber of Commerce might not think it worth while to establish a special music committee, but the idea is worthy of consideration.
