BANDON CASE TO BE TRIED

R. O. Moppin Indicted For Slashing Rube Gardiner In Fight.

COQUILLE, Ore., Dec. 16.—Tomorrow, it is expected, the case of the state of Oregon vs. R. O. Moppin, familiarly known at his home in Bandon as "Tennessee" will come up for trial. Moppin was indicted for assault with a dangerous weapon as a result of his slashing Rube Gardiner, former nightwatch at Bandon, with a knife in one of the Bandon lawdy houses. Gardiner was severely slashed but none of his wounds were of a permanent nature. A score of Bandon people have been subpoenaed for the trial.

Today, the case of Dr. Murrroughs of Marshfield, vs. J. D. McNeil, executor of the will of Mrs. John Nasburg, is being heard.

The grand jury failed to report any indictments today.

PROJECT TURNED DOWN.

Government Opposed to Umpqua River Improvement.

The Roseburg Review in an account of a Chamber of Commerce meeting there, says: "A letter was read from Senator Jonathan Bourne on the adverse report of the engineers on improvement of the Umpqua River for navigation between Scottsburg and Roseburg. It was developed, however, that the engineers found the movement entirely practical, but held that the probable amount of traffic to be handled would not justify the necessary expense of installing and maintaining the nine sets of locks and dams needed, at as many different rapids, to open the river to steamboat navigation. Here, again, at least one commercial body of Portland opposed the development of this movement for the betterment of Southern Oregon, as river navigation would materially lower freight rates and Portland jobbers would no longer be able to control this territory."
