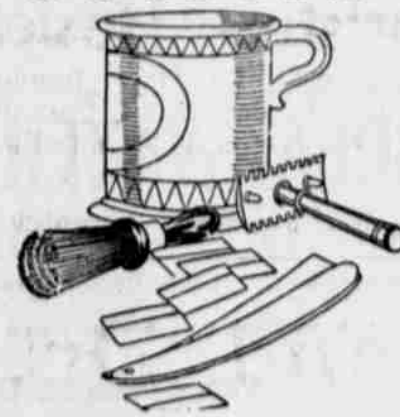
Lovers of vocal music will have the opportunity of again hearing Miss Louise Pavilla, the little singer who charmed the entire audience.
