Hume Estate Wants to Offset Recent Rogue River Fishing Law. The following self-explanatory petitions are being circulated by the Hume estate in Coos and Curry counties:

To the Governor, the Senate and the House of Representatives of the State of Oregon:

Whereas, the law recently passed closing Rogue River to commercial fishing will, by its needlessly sweeping terms, result in great injustice to vested interests, deprive many fishermen of their livelihood, and work hardship upon many farmers, render valueless fish hatcheries, canneries and similar plants valued at over \$250,000.00, and will seriously set back the country tributary to the lower river with no resulting benefit whatever, now, therefore,

We, the undersigned citizens and voters of the State of Oregon, respectfully petition and request that said law be so amended as to carry out the intent thereof and to do justice to all concerned by allowing commercial fishing, under proper restrictions, upon said Rogue River below the mouth of the Illinois River, except for steelhead trout.

TAXES ON MANSION TOTAL \$200 A DAY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—The \$7,000,000 Fifth-avenue home of ex-Senator William A. Clark of Montana, has been completed, after eight years of work, and will be occupied early next year. It is to be the costliest residence ever built in America. The taxes assessed on it by New York amount to more than \$200 a day.

The mansion contains 121 rooms, 31 baths and four picture galleries. No building in the world, according to experts who have inspected the interior, carries so much bronze as has been worked into this mansion. Although the best architects and decorators in this country were employed, Senator Clark himself designed much of the interior, as well as the exterior of the mansion.

The building contains one of the largest pipe organs in the world, which was installed at a cost of \$300,000. There are \$2,000,000 worth of pictures and \$500,000 worth of rugs.

MERRY CHRISTMAS SAYS WIND WILL SERVE AS FUEL.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 24.—Men will freeze to death on the Equator millions of years hence, according to Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, who in addressing the secular league discussed the question: "Is Man Ultimately to Starve or Freeze?" Dr. Wiley said he believed the earth was slowly cooling and that the people of the distant future must freeze, though he declared for "a million years at least" humanity would not suffer from lack of food or fuel.

In the frigid days that are yet to come, according to Dr. Wiley, the winds will serve as fuel.

"From my knowledge of the laws of electricity," he said, "and from practical experiments already being made, I prophesy that the currents of air which have been agents of destruction to man, will yet be harnessed for his benefit. In the future, the air will furnish heat, fuel and power, and companies will be formed for utilizing it. This is not a theory but an actuality of the future, based on actual conditions and natural laws."
