MILL RESUMES WORK MONDAY

C. A. Smith Plant Starts Operations Again After Making Extensive Repairs.

The C. A. Smith mill, which has been closed down for a week for repairs, will resume operations Monday morning, running at full capacity on the regular ten-hour schedule.

Considerable repair work and improvements have been made during the shut down so that the mill work will be facilitated and lumber manufactured more economically.

Mr. C. A. Smith is expected here next month from Minneapolis where he and his family, including Mr. and Mrs. Warner and baby of Sacramento, enjoyed a reunion at Christmas time.

Arno Meehan, general superintendent of the company, is expected back soon from Berkeley where he spent Christmas with his family.

The Smith-Powers Company is having Mr. Wilbur, an expert from California, gather statistics in their various camps on the cost of their logging operations. His reports will show the actual cost per thousand feet of delivering logs at the mill and are calculated to enable the operations to be conducted more economically.
