NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS.

Notice is hereby given that the annual licenses on dogs in the city of Marshfield are now due. The city ordinance provides as follows:
"The owner or persons having in charge any dog kept or owned within the city of Marshfield shall on or before the first day of January in each year pay to the city recorder the sum of three dollars for each and every male dog; the sum of \$5 for each and every female dog, which shall entitle him to a receipt from the city recorder designating the owners' name and the number of the license."
All dogs found within the city limits of the city of Marshfield without a license tag will be taken up by the city marshal and \$1 extra will be charged for same and if not paid then, the dog will be killed.
All licenses must be paid on or before January 15, 1911.
