## NEW YEAR'S AT WHITE HOUSE

President Taft and Official Family Extend Greetings to 5,265 Today.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 2. —The New Year's reception at the White House was held today under weather conditions that tended materially to cut down the number that unusually passes the receiving line in the Blue room. Mrs. Taft, who has gained much strength during the past year stood with the President at the head of the line during practically the entire time the reception was in progress. The White House was beautifully decorated for the occasion. The President received 5,265 persons, one hundred more than last year.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 2.—John Alden Dix, a democrat, was inaugurated governor of New York state at noon. Surrounded by a brilliant gathering in the great assembly chamber which was appropriately decorated for the occasion, Governor White who has been in the chair since Charles E. Hughes resigned to become associate justice of the Supreme Court, relinquished the office to Dix, the first democrat to assume the office in eighteen years.
