IT IS the condition referred to in the following article from the Wall Street Journal that has tended to kill all new, independent railroad plans, and may delay the Coos Bay line.

"A bewildered railroad president whose road sprang, by the enterprise and sacrifice of himself and a few people of like great faith, from a crack in the wilderness to a profitable and well-managed property, asks us a question to which we confess we can find no answer.

"Tomorrow, continues our bewildered friend, with the completion of the new extension log stumpage will be \$6 per thousand feet, because of the railroad construction; and the railroad will be transporting supplies not at thirty-five cents per ton per foot but at two cents, or less, if the citizens have their way.

"Our railroad friend's question will never be answered, if certain shippers and politicians can prevent. His shippers will still kick against a mill per ton per mile increase in rates, while they have seen their rates nearly doubled, and have themselves doubled the price of the supplies they sell to the railroad.

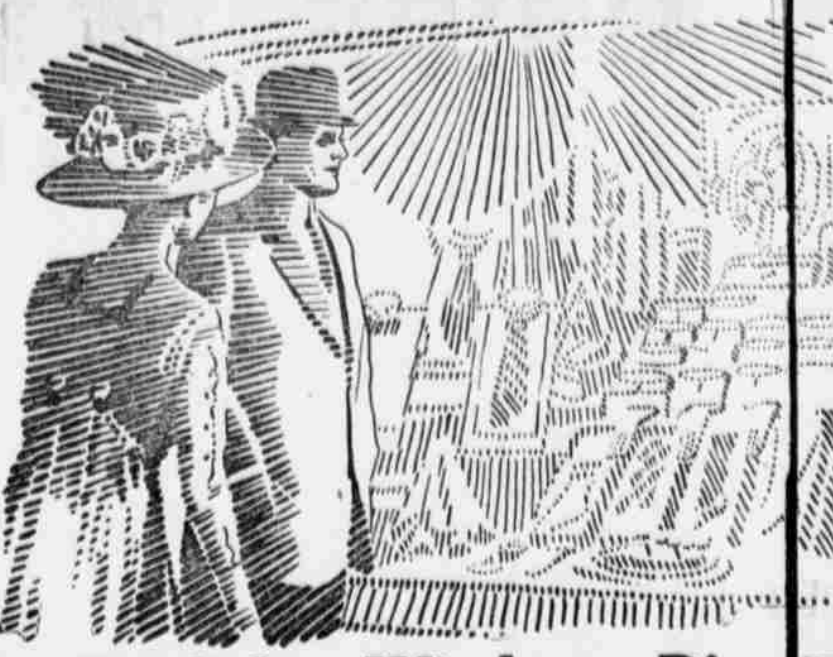
