NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS.

Notice is hereby given that the annual licenses on dogs in the city of Marshfield are now due. The city ordinance provides as follows: The owner or persons having in charge any dog kept or owned within the city of Marshfield shall on or before the first day of January in each year pay to the city recorder a sum of three dollars for each and every male dog; the sum of \$5 for each and every female dog, which entitles him to a receipt from the city recorder designating the dog's name and the number of license. Dogs found within the city of Marshfield without a license tag will be taken up by the city marshal and \$1 extra charged for same and if not seen, the dog will be killed. Licenses must be paid on or before January 15, 1911.

saloon, or, for the purpose of giving the same to any other person to be used, drank or consumed by such person in such saloon.

Section II.

"It is hereby made the duty of each proprietor and of each of the proprietors of each licensed saloon within the limits of the City of Marshfield, Oregon, to keep posted in a conspicuous place behind the bar of his or their saloon, a printed copy of this ordinance, printed in type large enough to be easily read by all persons in front of such bar.

Section III.

"Any person violating any provision of this ordinance, shall upon conviction therefor be fined in any sum not less than five (5) dollars nor more than twenty (20) dollars, and, in the case of the failure of any proprietor of any licensed saloon within the City of Marshfield to comply with the provisions and requirements of Section II of this ordinance, each day that he shall fail or refuse to comply with requirements of said Section shall constitute a separate and distinct offense, provided, however, that the parts and sections of this ordinance referring to the posting of a copy of this ordinance in licensed saloons shall be construed in certain cases as follows, viz: That where a saloon license is held or owned by two or more persons as partners, then, either of such partners but only one or them shall be liable for each violation."
