#### A GOOD EXAMPLE.

THE 300 men at the Masonic banquet in Iowa who pledged themselves not to indulge in profanity, set an example that men everywhere might well follow regardless of lodge affiliations.

Among all the useless habits which men have, none is more useless than the habit of profanity. It serves no good purpose whatsoever; it is a sign of weakness and lack of self-control; it is coarse; it befouls the mouth; it hurts character; it gives offense, and generally it is objectionable. Men who begin by swearing at what they consider big provocation to swear, end by swearing dreadful oaths at such little things as a speck of soot on the end of the nose. They swear when they are mad and when they are glad; they swear when matters are worse or when matters are well. It makes no difference ultimately what the occasion and on slightest excuse the mouth flows forth its nasty, blasphemous stream.

Elsewhere men are pledging themselves by thousands against profanity. In the Catholic church alone a movement of this sort is under way, which has enlisted hundreds of thousands already. Why shouldn't Coos Bay men, who stand for everything that is good and decent, get in line?

#### URGING RECIPROACITY.

CAN any open minded, well-informed man advance any sound reason why there should not be reciprocity between Canada and the United States?

The industrial and commercial interests of the adjoining sections of the two countries from the Gulf of St. Lawrence to Puget Sound, are substantially the same. Massachusetts needs the cheap coal of Nova Scotia; British Columbia, the capital and enterprise of the state of Washington.

The American tariff on Canadian coal benefits the coal barons of the United States, but hampers the industries and consumers that require inexpensive fuel.

The Canadian tariff on American fruit benefits whom? but deprives the Inland Empire of a logical market and the Canadian consumer of a necessity of life. The Spokesman-Review of December 20 and 21 pointed out that the mining development at Roseland, B. C., had been initiated by citizens of this state. President Bryan of Washington State college develops the inference for reciprocity by a letter to The Spokesman-Review.

He urges the abolition of our tariff on Canadian cereals, coal and lumber in exchange for Canada abolishing its tariff on American fruit and farm machinery. What he says about the advantages of such reciprocity to Spokane calls for serious consideration from the Spokane Chamber of Commerce and Representative-elect LaFollette. Western Canada and the western

United States both have to tackle the special interests entrenched at Ottawa as well as at Washington.—Spokesman-Review.

#### NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS.

Notice is hereby given that the annual licenses on dogs in the city of Marshfield are now due. The city ordinance provides as follows: "The owner or persons having in charge any dog kept or owned within the city of Marshfield shall on or before the first day of January in each year pay to the city recorder the sum of three dollars for each and every male dog; the sum of \$5 for each and every female dog, which shall entitle him to a receipt from the city recorder designating the owners' name and the number of the license."

All dogs found within the city limits of the city of Marshfield without a license tag will be taken up by the city marshal and \$1 extra will be charged for same and if not paid then, the dog will be killed. All licensees must be paid on or before January 15, 1911.
