COOS COUNTY SEED.

H. L. Stephens, the Fishtrap model farmer, returned from Portland recently, having been to the metropolis for the purpose of contracting his coming year's seed crop of grain, etc., which was accomplished without difficulty. So thorough is Mr. Stephens in his farming methods, and the soil and climatic conditions of Coos county are so excellent that the grain and seed he raises have become so well known as to create a demand for them far in excess of his ability to supply.

His principal crops are garden peas, oats, barley and wheat. Last
