S. P. PAID \$1,300,000 FOR COOS COUNTY RAILROAD

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 6.—The Southern Pacific Company paid \$1,300,000 for the property of the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern Railroad & Navigation Company when it bought it of J. D. Spreckels & Brothers Company in June 1906, according to an answer filed in the United States Court. The Southern Pacific and the Spreckels Company are joint defendants in a suit filed by R. A. Graham, one of the builders of the road, to secure possession of certain stock and bonds that Graham claims are his. The Southern Pacific, as one of its points of defense, states that at the time the sale was made and it became sole owner of the Coos Bay road, Graham made no claim for any share in the stock and bonds of the line, and that he therefore has no right to come forward with a claim at this time.

BUSINESS PROSPECTS.

The expected does not always happen; in fact, some philosophers go so far as to state that it seldom or never happens. For that reason we find the old year drifting out with the Eastern money markets in excellent shape. The New York stock market, with a three-day holiday ahead of it, displayed considerable strength, with advances scored in a number of securities. Money was plentiful at much lower rates than were quoted a month ago. There is so much sentiment involved in financial depressions that it is not always easy for the investing public to determine whether they should keep their money in circulation or lock it up until the disquieting rumors cease. The murmurings which began some time before the November election do not appear to have been warranted by the facts, and there has been a gradual recovery for several weeks, and the prospects for a brilliantly prosperous opening of 1911 are excellent.—Oregonian.

SHANNON TO BUY SALOON

A recent press dispatch from Selma, Cal., contains the following item concerning Dan Shannon which will be read with interest here. The dispatch says:

"In the dry town of Selma, Rev. Dan Shannon, in the closing meeting of his revival, offered to buy a saloon. He agreed to put up \$100, and from the house came offers of contributions of various sums, hundreds, fifties, tens, etc.

The particular grog shop Shannon agreed to buy is in the town of Del Rey. When the owner failed to take up the offer, Shannon shouted at him:

"You are a four-flusher!" The incident caused a great deal of excitement at the meeting.

It came about in this way: When an appeal was being made for people to "come forward" to profess conversion, it was reported to the evangelist by J. R. Cain, a furniture dealer, that a man named Culbertson, proprietor of a saloon in Del Rey, had expressed a desire to "go forward," but had stated that he had all his worldly possessions in his saloon. This statement is reported to have been made within the hearing of J. R. Cain, H. C. Tucker and M. G. Gallaher.

When it was reported to Shannon, he said:

"Come on, young man. If you mean business, I will give \$100 and the people of Selma will back me. We will buy your saloon and have a bon-fire in the morning."

Those who were near Culbertson say that he explained that he did not accept the evangelist's invitation as he did not think that was the way to do.

This being the concluding meeting, Shannon was given \$1,000 for his work. Converts are reported to the number of 467, there being thirty-three tonight."
