Is Candidate.—Geo. N. Farrin of Marshfield is a candidate for journal clerk in the state Senate which convenes at Salem this week. He left for there Saturday to look after his candidacy.

Council Tuesday.—The Marshfield city council will meet tomorrow night. Among the matters to come up is the application for the A. D. T. franchise, the recall petition on the Blake franchise extension and some street matters.

Many at Smoker.—The Millicoma club smoker Saturday night was attended by about 125 and proved a very enjoyable affair. R. N. Fenton with an orchestra of ten pieces furnished the music. Various games, a Kangaroo court and a little spread were features of the evening.

Pay For Ad.—Coos County will have a quarter page ad in the annual edition of the Portland Oregonian which will be issued next month. A balance of \$75 which remained in the old Coos county Chamber of Commerce fund and \$50 contributed by the Coos County court will be used in paying for it.

Bankruptcy Petition.—C. B. Selby as attorney for some of the creditors Saturday filed in the federal court at Portland a petition in involuntary bankruptcy against the North Bend Mercantile Company. The liabilities are estimated at \$22,000 and the assets at \$10,000. The company was put in hard straits as a result of the Kinney operations last summer.

Gathers Specimens.—H. Huron Smith, representing the Field Museum at Chicago, is in Marshfield to secure specimens of the timber grown in this section for that institution. The institution is gathering forestry specimens from all over the world. Mr. Smith is accompanied by his wife. He will make an exhaustive study of the various kinds of timber grown in this section.

Plan For Condensary.—The annual meeting of the Coos Bay Creamery Association was held Saturday and the old officers were reelected. Plans for building a condensary to be operated in conjunction with the creamery were discussed and a committee was appointed to solicit \$10,000 worth of stock subscriptions to build it. The proposition will take the place of the one recently launched by the Coos River ranchers.
