said that twenty manholes on the West Marshfield sewer system had to be changed after Sandberg had completed the plans and also that Mr. Sandberg had recommended to partially reimburse a widow woman in South Marshfield for expense in trying to get a sewer connection owing to an error in digging for it.

Mayor Straw wanted to know why Councilman Coke had not apprised him if this before.

Mr. Coke said that he had. The mayor said Mr. Coke was mistaken but the latter pointed out that he had at a certain time and the mayor said he must not have been paying attention to Coke's remarks.

Here the mayor turned to Councilman Copple again and wanted to know why all the secrecy about this plan had been maintained—why they had not come to him and let him (the mayor) know about it. He said it looked to him as though Mr. Copple and some of the others wanted to try and revolutionize things without giving any reason or explanation of it. Mr. Copple said he hadn't consulted the mayor about it because he didn't know of any reason why he should.

Here followed an animated debate between Messrs. Copple and Straw as to what was right. Mr. Copple said he was trying to what the people wanted him to and that he believed he was entitled to his views as to what was right as well as the mayor.

Mayor Straw said he didn't care what the people wanted that he was going to do what he thought was best, adding that the people were sometimes wrong.

Mr. Albrecht declared that his every move on the council had shown he was progressive and said that he didn't think a matter of changing engineers had anything to do with it. He declared that the council could show under a new engineer whether they were progressive or not. He said that he had desired to change engineers a year ago because he thought the people wanted a change. He said that he had made the motion the way he did because he didn't think it was right to hamper Mr. Sandberg in the future by discharging him for incompetency or anything that would cast a stain on his reputation. But, however, if the mayor insisted on it he would change his motion that Mr. Sandberg be discharged or asked to resign. He said it was not his intention to be underhanded about it as the mayor had intimated.

Mr. Copple said that he thought that Mr. Albrecht's original motion was the best way and was letting Mr. Sandberg down easy.

Mayor Straw insisted otherwise—that a reason should be ascribed and that he should not be let out under the guise of dispensing with the engineer for a few weeks. He said it was a public matter and that the
