Lease Building.—Ellerby and Hunter have leased the room in the O'Connell building on Front street recently vacated by Mrs. Aiken's millinery and will start a restaurant and fish market in it.

Sells Car.—C. R. Peck has disposed of his auto to Dr. A. L. Houseworth who will sell his old machine. Mr. Peck plans to get an electric machine in the near future.

Relative Dead.—Mrs. Wm. Horsfall, Jr., has received word of the death of her half sister, Miss Marguerite Yoakam, at Gridley, Cal., where she was visiting her father. No particulars were given.

Elks Meet.—Last evening, W. C. Swain, who recently moved from Coquille to Marshfield, was initiated by Marshfield lodge of Elks. There was a good turnout and the initiation was followed by a banquet and social time.

Collects Licenses.—So far, Marshal Carter has collected dog licenses on thirty-eight canines in Marshfield. All licenses must be paid by January 15 or the owners may have to pay a penalty to rescue their dogs from the city pound.

State Chaplain.—Rev. J. Richard Olsen, chaplain of the Marshfield Divisions of the Oregon Naval Reserves, has been honored with the appointment as state chaplain of the organization. The appointment came with the commissions for the officers of the local divisions.

Boys Bother.—A number of boys have been causing considerable disturbance around the entrance to the new quarters of the Marshfield public library. Unless the lads reform mighty quick, Marshal Carter will probably be requested to arrest a few of them.

Is Reappointed.—Postmaster Elmer F. Russell of North Bend, has been reappointed by President Taft for another four years, his appointment being made this week. There was no contest for the place. As Mr. Russell has given very good satisfaction in the place, the news of his reappointment will be gratifying to patrons of the North Bend office.

Mail Letters.—The Marshfield Western Union office has been advised that the company has extended its night letter messages so that letters will be received for foreign points. The plan is to have the letters transmitted by telegraph to New York where they will be mailed, thus reducing the time from Pacific coast points by about six days. The company charges merely the regular night letter rate of \$1 plus five cents for postage.

Case Is Tried.—A large number of Allegany people are in attendance at the trial of the case of W. Hunt vs. Herbert Blake which is being heard in Justice Pennock's court. Hunt is suing for wages alleged to be due for building a house at Allegany for Mr. Blake. Mr. Blake contends that the property belongs to his wife and consequently he is not liable for the claim.

Is Cashier.—Dorsey Kretzer has been elected cashier of the First National bank to succeed W. S. McFarland. The election of the remaining officers was postponed until further communication is received from Washington relative to the merger of the First National and First Trust and Savings banks, which will be in a few days.
