GOES EAST TO BUY STOCKS

R. A. COPPLE WILL VISIT EASTERN FACTORIES TO SECURE GOODS DIRECT FOR HIS MARSHFIELD AND BANDON STORES.

R. A. Copple, proprietor of the Golden Rule stores in Marshfield and Bandon, left this morning via Drain on his semi-annual trip to eastern markets to buy his late spring and summer stocks of goods. Mr. Copple has made it a practice to buy direct from the factories, thus securing later styles and better goods at lower prices than if he were to buy through the usual jobbers. This enables him to sell at a much lower rate than he would otherwise be able to do.

"While these trips are expensive and take about five weeks of my time, I find that they are very advantageous for my stores," said Mr. Copple yesterday. "By going direct to the centers, principally St. Louis and New York and vicinity and sometimes in and around Chicago, I am able to select better goods and more up-to-date goods than I would be able to obtain from the average western coast jobber or traveling salesman. Not only this, but often I am able to pick up stocks of fine goods at factories that have over-estimated the demand in certain lines at actual cost or sometimes less. Buying for the two stores and making one shipment, also cuts down the cost and enables me to sell at prices far below what would otherwise be necessary."

"Just this week, we received a shipment of muslin spring underwear from the Peerless Manufacturing company of Newport, New Hampshire, which I contracted for during my last trip. These with other reasonable goods will be placed on sale here at once. I expect to add considerably to my spring line this trip and will buy heavily for the summer and fall. The last year has been a very successful one for both our stores."
