

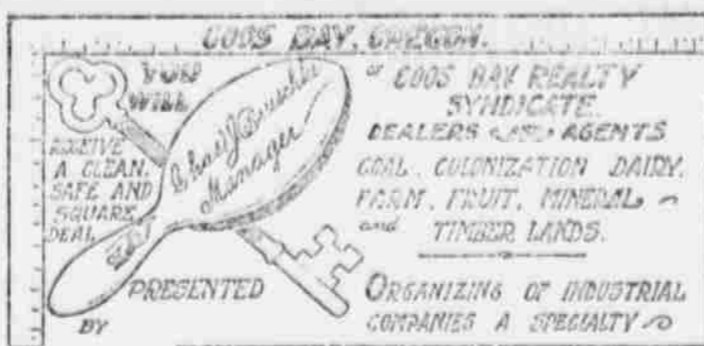

**TEXT OF MARSHFIELD'S CITY  
ORDINANCE GOVERNING SALOONS**

(Continued from Page 6.)

with a printed copy of this Ordinance and each such dealer shall at all times keep said license and said copy of this Ordinance conspicuously posted in his place of business in such position that the same may be easily read by anyone frequenting the same.

SECTION 15. Every person convicted of a violation of this Ordinance to whom a license has been granted hereunder, shall thereby forfeit such license issued to him, which said license, upon proof of conviction, shall be revoked by the Common Council, and thereafter no license shall issue to such person under this Ordinance, within one year from the date of such revocation; provided, that the above enumerated cause shall not exclude other causes for revoking any license granted hereunder.

SECTION 16. Any keeper or proprietor of any saloon, bar-room, or other place where spirituous, malt or vinous liquors are sold or kept for sale, or any bar-tender, employee, or any other person, who shall sell, barter, exchange or give away or cause to be sold, bartered, exchanged or given away, any intoxicating liquor to any person already intoxicated, or to any person under the age of twenty-one years, or to any person in the habit of becoming intoxicated, or to any person during any of the times or hours when saloons are required to remain closed by this Ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof before the Recorder's Court be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the City Jail not less than ten days or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court.

SECTION 17. The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to the sale of liquors for medicinal purposes by a regularly licensed druggist upon the prescription of a physician or surgeon entitled to practice medicine under the laws of the State of Oregon, provided that any druggist selling spirituous, malt or vinous liquors otherwise than upon said prescription of a licensed physician shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this Ordinance and shall be punished accordingly.

SECTION 18. Ordinance No. 289, entitled: "An Ordinance to license, regulate and prevent bar-rooms, saloons, and drinking shops and to prohibit the sale of liquor without a license," and all Ordinances and parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 19. Whereas the present Ordinance governing the granting of licenses for the sale of spirituous, malt or vinous liquors, and relating to the other matters in this Ordinance contained is defective in that it does not provide for the forfeiture of such licenses and in that it does not require the closing of all places wherein spirituous, malt or vinous liquors are sold between 12 P. M. of Saturday and 5 A. M. of the following Monday.

Now, Therefore, the enactment of this Ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the peace, health and safety of the City, and an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.

Passed by the Common Council of the City of Marshfield, this 31st day of December, 1910.

**YEAR'S RECORD GOOD.**

**Myrtle Point Made a Substantial  
Building Growth During 1910.**

While Myrtle Point did not make a sensational record at building development last year, there was a very commendable growth, and of a substantial nature, particularly in the residential section of town. Improvements to the estimated value of probably \$30,000 were made. In the business section the two important improvements were the Unique theatre and the moving of the depot to the foot of Maple street with improved yarding facilities.

In the residence section a number of nice buildings were built or are in course of construction. The residences of W. T. Dement, Ben McMullen and B. C. Shull, such as would grace a city of many thousand people. Large rooms, permanently constructed and with that most beautiful of all finishes—Oregon fir. Each one will cost several thousand dollars when completed.

Then there is the Chandler home in process of construction, the Presbyterian manse, the L. B. Fetter home, Horace Berry's house, Dal Bellen's home, the Stevens house, and perhaps a half dozen other houses, so that the year will pass as one of good, substantial growth in Myrtle Point.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
