Mahoney Re-elected.—C. J. Mahoney, formerly of Marshfield, was beaten by J. P. Hunt of Marion county for assistant clerk of the House at Salem last week by a vote of sixteen to fourteen.

Dredge Busy.—The dredge Oregon is now working opposite Porter and is making good progress. She is still pumping in behind the bulkheads which is holding the dredging in good shape.

Capt. Dunham Ill.—Coos Bay parties have received word from San Francisco that Capt. R. J. Dunham, a former Coos County man but now master of the Roanoke, is critically ill at a hospital there.

Change in Firm.—Blanchard Brothers have purchased Mr. Rezin's interest in the livery firm of Blanchard, Rezin and Blanchard, and will conduct the business alone henceforth. For the present, Arthur Blanchard will manage the business.

Investigates Cannery.—Capt. Reynolds of Portland is here looking over this section to ascertain if another fish cannery could be operated here to advantage. He is familiar with this section, having been with the late R. D. Hume on Rogue river a number of years ago.

Meet Wednesday.—The Bridge club will be entertained by Mrs. L. J. Simpson at her home in North Bend Wednesday afternoon, January 18. This is a week earlier than the regular meeting date, having been changed on account of Mrs. Simpson's intended departure from the bay on a visit.

Sells Wagon.—Constable Cox today sold the delivery wagon of the People's cooperative store to Ben Wright who had a labor lien on it for \$48. Besides paying the lien and expenses of the auction, there was a balance of about \$7 which was turned over to J. E. Quick, president of the defunct company.

Wed in Portland.—Announcements were received here today of the marriage of Mrs. Mae B. McCann and Walter M. Christenson which was solemnized at the home of C. Christenson, 123 East Twenty-ninth street, Portland, January 10, by Rev. Henry G. Nave of a Portland Presbyterian church. The contracting parties are well-known here, the bride having resided at the Coos River

creamery for the last few years. They will be at home in Marshfield after January 20.

Keep Children Clean.—A press dispatch from Salem says: "Senator Chase of Coos county, proposes to introduce a bill that all school children should be kept clean. Its ideas as yet have not been fully developed."

Feed For Haines.—The Nann Smith brought a big shipment of feed from San Francisco today for A. T. Haines, the Coos Bay hay, flour and feed dealer. It was one of the largest consignments he has yet received and will enable him to fill all kinds of orders now.

Sold Second Hand Store.—The stock of goods in the Ketchum second-hand store on North Front street was sold today to W. K. Wiseman, the transfer being effected through the agency of L. Amadon, Mr. Wiseman will continue to operate both stores.

Decides Case.—Justice Pennock today rendered a decision in the case of Ben Wise vs. J. A. O'Kelly in favor of the defendant. Wise was suing to collect a note for \$150 which was given in the state of Washington about ten years ago. Capt. O'Kelly pleaded that the statute of limitations had run on it but Wise contended that O'Kelly had left Washington before the statute of limitations had run on it and consequently was still liable. Justice Pennock held that as O'Kelly had been in Oregon more than six years, the period required by the statute of limitations in this state, that the note could not be collected.
