RECIPE FOR HAPPY MARRIAGE.

THE experience of a married couple who have lived together for seventy years without a quarrel possesses a practical value which outweighs any amount of theorizing and the reasons for the happy union given by Mr. and Mrs. Levi Sherwood, who enjoy this distinction, having recently celebrated their seventieth wedding anniversary in New York, have a wide interest. "We just loved each other and that was all there was to it," says Mrs. Sherwood. But the true recipe seems to be contained in the husband's remark that he "minded his own business, while she tended to her own affairs."
