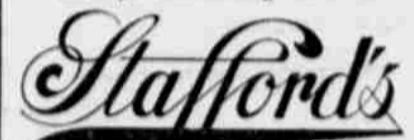

Fear Freshets.—The heavy rain today, it is feared, will cause some severe freshets. There is much snow in the mountains and this in addition to the heavy rain will mean a vast volume of water.

Alliance Still Delayed.—No word has been received here yet as to when the Alliance will sail from Portland here, but it is expected that it will be within a day or two. After leaving the drydock at Portland last Friday, it was found that the calking had not been done properly and she had to go back on again.

Many at Concert.—There was a good attendance at the band concert given by the Coos Bay Naval Reserve band at the Masonic Opera house Sunday afternoon. The program is declared to have been one of the best if not the best that the band has ever given. It was warmly applauded throughout.

Slightly Hurt.—L. E. Babcock, a gas maker at the Oregon Power company's plant in North Bend, was slightly injured this morning by an explosion and fall. It seems that he neglected to blow the old gas out of the generator before attempting to light it and was blown down from the step-ladder. He was taken to Mercy hospital where he is getting along as well as could be expected.

Pleaded Guilty.—Word from Bandon is that Ray Brown and Arthur Young, who have many aliases and who passed forged checks here and at Bandon, pleaded guilty when arraigned before Justice Rae at Bandon. They were bound over to the grand jury under \$1,000 bonds and not being able to furnish it are being detained in the county jail at Coquille by Sheriff Gage. It is suspected that they are the men who passed bogus checks around Eugene some time ago. The third member of the gang has not been located yet.
