PRESIDENT TAFT IS TO TRY NEW PLAN AT WHITE HOUSE

Private Secretaries to President Must Be of Cabinet Calibre.

TO REPLACE NORTON BY HILLES BY MARCH 4

William Barnes Jr., Elected Chairman of New York Republicans.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—Charles D. Hilles, assistant secretary of the Treasury, has been offered by President Taft the position of secretary to the President.

Secretary Norton will retire to private life after March 5 or later, the President's wishes being the principal factor fixing date.

Future secretaries to the President probably will be men of cabinet calibre, men who could relieve the President of much departmental work and whose decisions will practically be final.

Under the reorganization of the executive force brought about during Norton's short term at the White House, all of the force with the exception of the secretary will practically be a permanent body.

The tube kept the drowning man afloat until the police arrived.

COURTS WILL PASS ON CUNNINGHAM DEAL

Says That Litigation Will Eliminate Necessity of Legislation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—Attorney General Wickersham discussed the Alaska coal land bill today before the Senate Committee on Public Lands. He declared the bill would tie up all lands so as to make development impossible. Regarding the Cunningham claims, he said if the courts decided the claimants entitled to the claims and decided likewise in the cases about 200 other claimants, the lands should be released to the claimants. In such event, said the attorney general, there will be no need for the passage of such a bill.

WAR ON ISLANDS.

Santo Domingo and Haytian Troops Will Soon Meet.
