THE WEATHER.

OREGON, Jan. 23.—Fair in east and rain or snow in west tonight and Tuesday.

Meet Tuesday.—The Marshfield city council will meet Tuesday night to take up various matters.

Date Fixed.—The Oregon Supreme Court has fixed February 7 as the date for reargument of the Port of Coos Bay case.

Meet Tonight.—The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce will hold a general meeting tonight to discuss the employers' liability law and other matters of importance.

Meet Wednesday.—The Ladies' Aid of the Methodist church will meet at the parsonage Wednesday at 2 o'clock in the afternoon for a social time. All are invited to attend.

Met Saturday.—The Marshfield school board met Saturday but only took up routine matters. The petition of some of the teachers asking for pay for the holiday vacation has not been filed with the board yet.

Cold Last Night.—The thermometer dropped to 25 above zero last night, the second coldest of the year. One night during the sleet and snow storm, it reached 24 above but it was generally not felt so keenly as the cold last night.

Died at Hood River.—The funeral of Mrs. J. L. Bowman, formerly Miss Lydia Rogers, was held in Portland Friday. Later advice is that Mrs. Bowman died at Hood River, Oregon, where she was visiting friends. It was first announced that she died at their home in Irvington but this was erroneous.

No Chautauqua.—A proposition to conduct a chautauqua here which was submitted to the Chamber of Commerce has been decided upon adversely for the present. It would cost upwards of \$2,000 for the chautauqua and it is not believed that existing conditions warrant it for another year or two.

Fishing Boat Ashore.—The local United Wireless station picked up a message Saturday night saying that the fishing boat Chicago had gone ashore at Millbank Sound, about 100 miles from Katchikan, Ala. She got off without serious damage and yesterday was proceeding to Seattle accompanied by the steamer Bertha.

Anvil Due.—The steamer Anvil is due here on her initial trip from Portland. J. W. Bennett, chairman of the local reception committee, has not been appointed yet when the delegation of Portland business men who were to come on her will make their visit here, their coming being postponed on account of the recent rough weather.

Quit Fair District.—The Eugene Guard says: "At the annual meeting of the Lane County Fair association Saturday, it was decided to follow the move of Roseburg and break connections with the Second Southern Oregon District Agricultural Society, in the effort to reorganize this district entirely. There are still left in this association Curry and Coos counties.

Introduces Bill.—Joint Representative Pierce of Coos and Curry counties has introduced a bill in the legislature at Salem providing for state aid for high schools. The income from corporation licenses, etc., is to be used to establish the fund, \$1,000 of which is to go each year to each county and the balance to be divided among the high schools according to the number of teachers.
