HOW FAR DID HE GET RIDE?

Coos Bay Men Are Perplexed Over New Railroad Problem.

C. R. Peck, Dr. Houseworth, W. F. Miller, Dorsey Kreitzer and a few others have a railroad problem that is more perplexing just for the time being than the great railroad problem of "When will Coos Bay get a Railroad?" Here is the problem, given a local tinge, according to the way C. R. Peck puts it:

"Doctor Houseworth took the train yesterday at the Marshfield depot for Summit which is a station ten miles from Marshfield. The train was a mile long with the last car at the depot door. When the train started, the Doctor got in a hurry and began to walk towards the front of the train and arrived at the front car just as that car was stopping at Summit. He was about to get off when he happened to think that his ticket called for ten miles, and in as much as he thought he had walked a mile, he demanded a rebate of four cents. The conductor

refused his request and referred the Doctor to Superintendent Miller. After spending a sleepless night on the problem, Superintendent Miller decided that in as much as the Doctor had arrived at his destination and the train had been carrying him all the time he was getting there, that the Railroad Company had carried out the contract embodied in its ticket."

Now the Doctor is asking advise of his friends as to whether or not he shall appeal his claim, and promises to give any person, who will advise him correctly, a five-cent cigar or a drink of soda."

TO ABOLISH HOLIDAYS.

School Days Will Be School Days According to Neuner's Bill.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23.—Representative Neuner's standing among the school children of the state will depreciate about 110 per cent if the bill he introduces in the House becomes a law. The measure proposes to abolish all school holidays. In this it does not even except Washington's birthday or Arbor day. It provides, however, that on these two days exercises appropriate to the occasion shall be held in the schools. Provision is made that general election or primary day, where the teacher is a legal voter, school may be closed at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon to enable the teacher to vote.

MEDFORD HAS HOT POLITICS

W. F. Rau, Formerly of Marshfield, Mixed In Lively Affair There.

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 23.—Judge E. E. Kelly, lawyer, and Walter F. Rau, part owner of the hotel Moore, had a political argument at the hotel Nash, which, from reports of various bystanders, would have left a very small grease spot of the latter if six or seven men had not interfered at the moment when things were the liveliest.

Rau was much excited over the statement of W. W. Elfert, published in The Sun, and mentioning him in an uncomplimentary manner and said something of an unprintable nature about Mr. Elfert. Then he happened to see Kelly a few feet away holding an argument with Porter J. Neff. Rau approached Kelly and repeated the former remark about Elfert.

"Why don't you say that about me, you ——— of a grafter?" said Kelly. "I am the one that is behind that statement."

Rau struck him on the jaw—couldn't miss it, the fellows say. Kelly tore at him like a wild bull. With his monstrous frame and the terrific piston stroke of his gigantic arms, the way Kelly went after him was pitiful to see.

The first blow was a clean knock-down and Rau fell back against some slats used as braces for a stairway that is being built.

Kelly let him get up and knocked him down again among the slats and lumber. A third time he landed on Rau, but the latter's strength against the giant was like an infant. Meanwhile some six or seven men by crowding in and filling the space it was made possible for Rau to make his getaway into the bar-room. That was all that ended the fight. Rau was cut about the chin and bled profusely. Later in the evening he returned to the Nash, but Kelly did not happen to be there.

ACKERMAN'S NEW JOB.

Former State Superintendent Heads Monmouth School.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23.—J. H. Ackerman, who has just completed a service of 12 years as state superintendent of public instruction in this state, was elected president of the state normal school, which is to be re-established at Monmouth as the result of the adoption of an initiative measure with that end in view November 8. The salary of the president is fixed by the board at \$3,600 a year.
