Former State Superintendent Heads Monmouth School.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23 .- J. H. Ackerman, who has just completed a service of 12 years as state superintendent of public instruction in this state, was elected president of the state normal school, which is to be re-established at Monmouth as the result of the adoption of an initiative measure with that end in view November 8. The salary of the president is fixed by the board at \$3,600 a year.
