MANY BILLS IN LEGISLATURE

Some of the More Important Legislation Suggested at Salem.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—Three bills carrying out ideas advanced in Senator Bowerman's message as acting governor were introduced by him. They relate to the management of state institutions and the method of buying supplies, also creation of the office of assistant secretary of state.

One of these bills hits all city, county or state officers or employees who are engaged in any business whereby they sell its wares to any city, county or state. If enacted it would touch all along the line, for numerous officials are known to own stock in corporations which do business with municipal, county or state governments. It fixes a penalty of one to five years in the penitentiary or a fine of \$500 to \$5,000.

Another of Bowerman's bills places the buying of all supplies in the hands of the state board, the purchasing to be done for all the institutions at once by competitive bidding.

The third Bowerman bill creates the office of assistant secretary of state, the purpose being to have a second man in the secretary of state's office who will have full power to act whenever his superior is sick or is occupying the office of governor.

The proposal to create the office of lieutenant governor also has in view the curing of complications arising under the present system, whereby the secretary of state becomes governor when a vacancy in the governor's office occurs. The office of lieutenant governor, however, can be created only by constitutional amendment, requiring a vote of the people.

Bills Pending.

Some of the most important measures introduced are epitomized as follows:

S. B. 82, Carson—Calling for mining companies to file annual statements with the secretary of state.

S. B. 83, Bean and Calkins—Creating Coos, Curry and Douglas as the second Southern Oregon District Agricultural Society.

S. B. 85, Merryman—Limits killing to 25 ducks a week in certain counties.

S. B. 84, Carson—Claimants of

water for power development to pay annual license fee for each water horsepower.

S. B. 86, Merryman—Prohibiting deer hunting during night, and limiting to three deer a season.

S. B. 89, Hawley—Prohibiting county officials from making contracts with county courts in which they are directly interested.

S. B. 90, Albee—Sterilization bill which Dr. Owens Adair has been advocating.

H. B. No. 65—By Pierce of Coos and Curry, fixing the salary of the clerks of the land board.

S. B. 70, by Bowerman—Providing that bankers and banking companies cannot invest money in certain corporation stocks.

S. B. 72, by Carson—Providing that inmates of jails and penitentiaries shall work on public roads.

S. B. 73, by Malarkey—Increasing powers of railroad commission to extend to public utilities.

S. B. 77, by Chase—Amending the game laws in relation to ducks, for Coos, Curry and Lake counties.

S. B. 79, by Albee, by request—Creating Oregon Naval Militia.

S. B. 80, by Merryman—Prohibiting shooting of wild geese and swan in certain prescribed counties.

S. B. 116, Malarkey—Abolishing office of State Food and Dairy Commissioner.

S. B. 117, Chase—Vermin infected and unsanitary pupils to be scoured.

S. B. 118, Barrett of Washington, by request—Vendors of quack remedies to pay monthly license of \$100 to Secretary of State.

S. B. 119, Barrett of Washington—Authorizing State Treasurer to deposit school fund in banks.

S. B. 120, Calkins—Making responsible for damage those who sell liquor to intoxicated persons.
