IT WILL BE BIG BUSINESS YEAR

Another Great Period of Commercial and Industrial Activity Coming.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Jan. 24.—Another great period of commercial activity and industrial progress is about to open up; Eastern banking houses and great financial institutions are extremely optimistic with regard to the outlook for the coming year; confidence, which has been more or less wavering immediately prior to and following the November elections, has been fully restored and that conservatism, which has militated strongly against the investment of hoarded money is rapidly disappearing. This, at least, is the opinion reached by E. W. Purdy, president of the First National bank of this city, who has just returned from an extensive trip to Washington, D. C., Boston, Mass., and New York. During this trip Mr. Purdy took special pains to familiarize himself with industrial and commercial conditions in the East and he is extremely enthusiastic with regard to the immediate outlook.

Postoffice Appropriation Bill Passed House.

LEAVE TODAY ON ALLIANCE

Steamship Sails for Eureka This Morning—Returns Thursday.

The Alliance crossed out this morning for Eureka, not having been able to get away last evening on account of the delay in unloading freight here.

It is expected that she will return here Thursday and probably will sail the same day for Portland.

The postoffice appropriation bill was passed by the House. An amendment increasing the pay of rural mail carriers \$100 per year was added just before the vote was taken. The effort to substitute stamps to the franking privilege was ruled out.

URGE CHANGE IN OREGON LAW

Marshfield Chamber of Commerce Passes on Employers' Liability.

At a meeting of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce last night, a resolution was adopted urging the Coos county legislators at Salem to use their influence to secure the repeal of the present Oregon Employers' Liability Law and the enactment of a substitute that will be more equitable to both employer and employee.

This action was taken after an extended discussion of the paper lead by J. V. Smeaton, general manager of the C. A. Smith mill. Mr. Smeaton read a carefully prepared paper showing the liability laws of England and Germany, of other states and giving the findings of a special commission that had investigated the matter. This paper will be left on file at the Chamber of Commerce and a resolution was adopted ordering that two or three hundred copies be printed and distributed among the legislators at Salem. This will be done immediately by the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce.

Hugh McLain presented a copy of a bill recently introduced in the legislature which provides that no one railway can secure any pass or right of way in Oregon and shut other railways out. It provides that where the pass will permit only one railroad, that the owner of the track must permit other lines to use it. The object of the bill, Mr. McLain stated, was to prevent the Southern Pacific or any other line bottling up any section of the state by securing and retaining the only means of reaching there. The bill was indorsed and the Coos county legislators urged to support it.

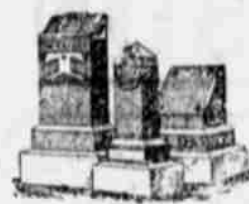

Resolutions favoring the appropriation of \$50,000 per annum by the State of Oregon to fight forest fires which were adopted at the last meeting have been forwarded to the Coos county legislators and their support of the measure urged.
