## WILHELMINA IS STILL FAST

### Gasoline Schooner Maybe Pulled Off Umpqua Spit by Next Saturday.

The steamer Wilhelmina which went aground on the South Spit of the Umpqua last Saturday morning is still fast and at low tide is high and dry.

The telephone wire between here and Gardiner is still down but the above information was given Jack Planagan by parties direct from there. It was stated that it was now hoped to get her off Saturday.

As near as can be ascertained, the Wilhelmina went aground by the pilot, Capt. Tyler mistaking the channel buoys. She is fast inside the bar but there being no jetty, this does not afford her any protection. It is not known how much the Wilhelmina is insured for.

## FRANCHISE FOR HEATING PLANT

council and asked permission to construct a cess pool for a house on Central avenue near thirteenth street underneath the street. He had started to construct the cess pool on his own lot but R. T. Street objected because it was not twenty feet away from an adjoining lot belonging to Street. Judge Hall's house is too low to be connected with the sewer. Messrs. Street and Hall had a little tilt about the matter and finally it was referred to the health committee to decide.

### Other Business.

Chas. Bonebrake appeared before the council and objected to a proposed plan of Dr. Houseworth's to move the dirt Twelfth Court, adjoining Houseworth's home, to near Bonebrake's lot. Mr. Bonebrake said if it was done he would have to build 100 feet of bulkhead and that the fill would not do any good now. He was assured that the fill would not be made.

Dr. E. Mingus was given permission for him, John F. Hall and W. J. Douglas to grade and plank the alley between their properties in West Marshfield.

An acceptance of the franchise given the A. D. T. was read and ordered placed on file.

Dr. Mingus reported that a proposed milk inspection ordinance had not been completed as he and Mrs. Yoakam, the inspector, had not had

time enough to secure the regulations in vogue elsewhere.

A rebate of \$540.77 was ordered paid to the property owners on Highland avenue between Broadway and Fifth street.

Several contractors were ordered paid small amounts of their contracts and a number of current bills were ordered paid.

Marshal Carter was instructed to hasten the collection of assessments for street and sewer improvements.

### Bulkhead Waterfront.

Councilman Ferguson was instructed to take steps to have the property owners along the waterfront in north Marshfield construct a bulkhead so that the dredge Oregon can fill in all the lowland opposite Fernedale. Dr. Straw said that practically all the property owners were willing to do it but that they were waiting for someone to line them up. Mayor Straw asked Dr. Mingus if the Port Commission would not do it and the latter replied they would be glad to only that they disliked to do anything until the Oregon Supreme Court has decided the case involving the legality of the commission. The plan is to build the bulkhead about sixty or 100 feet back of the harbor line to prevent it squashing out into the channel. Mr. Ferguson will take steps at once to have a bulkhead put in that will comply with the wishes of the United States Engineers. The bulkhead is to extend north from the Standard Oil warehouse.

The bulkhead to permit the paving of North Front street has been contracted for and will be put in just as soon as Nobles complete their job at North Bend, it was reported to the council.
