

GIVES VIEWS ON WATERWORKS

Edgar McDaniel of North Bend Sets Forth Situation As He Sees It.

Edgar McDaniel, editor of the North Bend Harbor and a member of the special committee of North Bend city council to endeavor to secure an adequate water system for North Bend and Marshfield, makes the following statement in his paper this week of the situation:

"That North Bend is as helpless as a child as regards water pressure fire protection is a fact that no one will dispute. Firemen Thursday night fought fire without water—and succeeded too. A hose was attached to one of the hydrants that the city pays the Marshfield Water Co., a monthly rental of \$26.50 and not enough water could be had to throw a stream over a man's head. The salt water mains, with four big

steam pumps on the waterfront attached at intervals failed the fire boys, and it was not until after the big building had nearly burned down and two buildings on the opposite side of the street were ablaze that pressure was raised sufficient to control the fire. The system cost the city \$8,000 to begin with and many large sums of money have been expended for repairs on same since. It is evident that something is wrong, all will agree to that. Expert advice reveals that the salt water system is faulty but not so seriously so but it can be remedied. We need no expert advice to be convinced that the Marshfield Water company cannot be of benefit without an entire re-installation. What are the people going to do about this? We are one of the many citizens who do not propose to sit idly by and see our town burn up, taking chances of having every penny's worth of property we own destroyed. "We have been convinced that these conditions can be remedied for all time to come and we are going to see that the people have an opportunity of each saying for himself whether or not they shall be remedied."

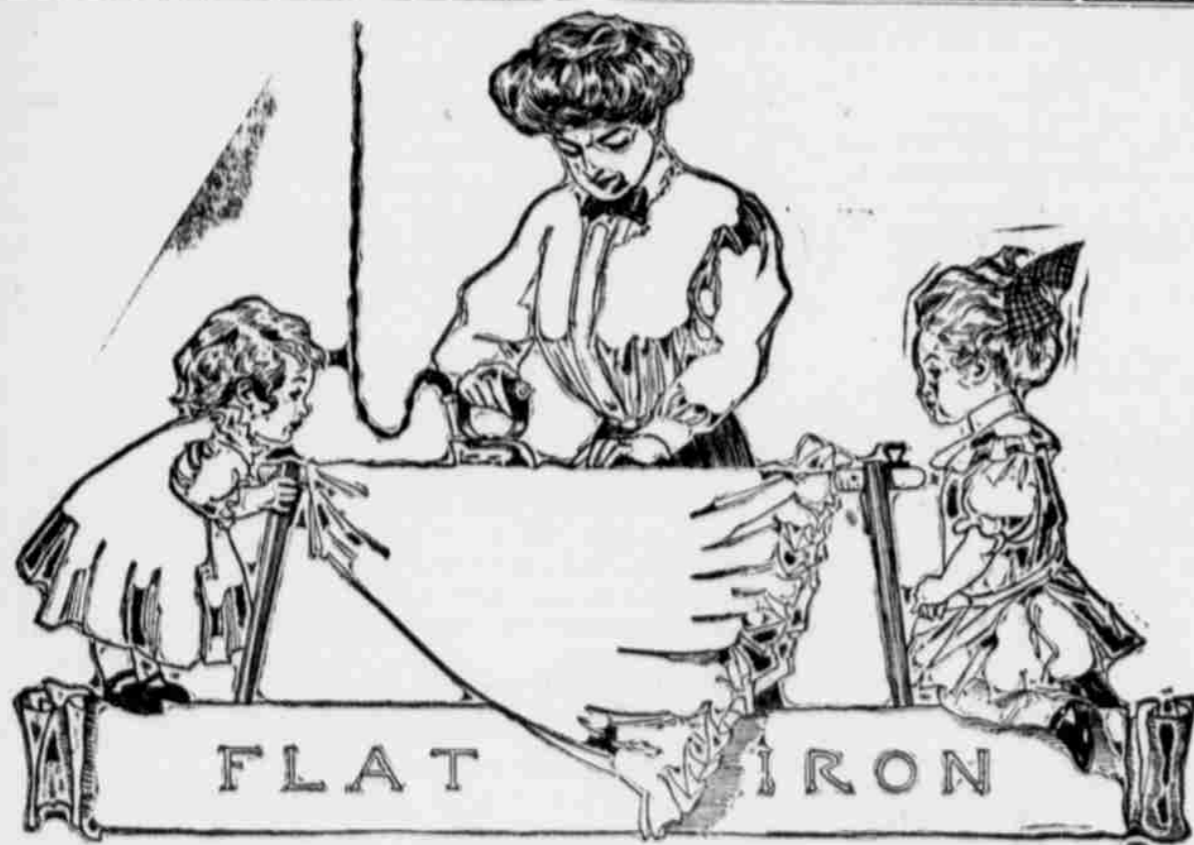
