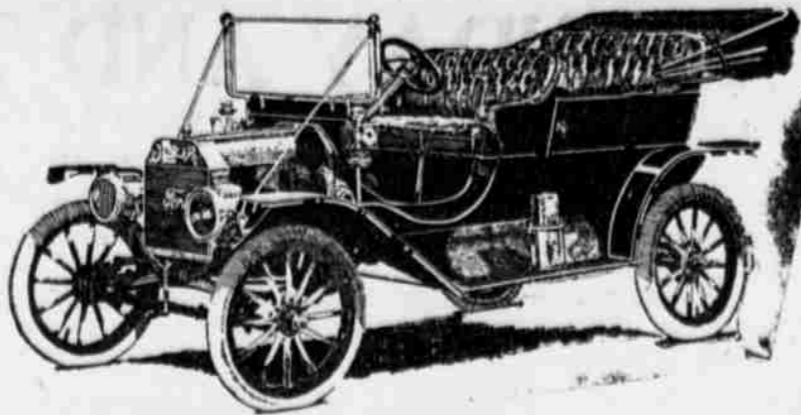

## MARSHFIELD SCHOOL NEWS.

### HIGH SCHOOL NEWS.

President Kerr of Oregon Agricultural College will probably be the commencement speaker at several of the Coos county high school commencement exercises this coming June. At the last meeting of the high school association at Coquille during the holiday vacation, superintendent Raab of North Bend was instructed to write the president to see if he could be secured. A favorable reply has been received and it is probable that President Kerr will be the commencement speaker at Marshfield on June 7th. The superintendent has not as yet considered the matter with the school board but will do so immediately.

The German club met with Miss Inez Johnson Thursday evening. Miss May Preuss presented a paper on "The Life and Work of Martin Luther." The paper was instructive and excellently prepared. German schools and German universities were considered by Miss Montgomery. The work of this club is very gratifying to those interested in the spirit and work of the high school. It has done an excellent work ever since it was organized in the fall. There is also a splendid work to be done by a Latin club. It is hoped that such a club may be organized in the no distant future.

No written examinations will be given in the first three grades, but pupils will be passed to the next class or be retained to repeat the work of their class according to the quality of work done by them during the semester. be given. They have been arranged so that one will come each day of the week during the first two hours of the morning session; during the remainder of the day school work will go on as usual in these respective grades. This arrangement will seem to equalize the work of the teachers by distributing it throughout the week and it will not necessitate the absence of any honorary pupils from school while their mates are writing examinations. There will therefore be school every day as usual for all grade pupils.

The high school examinations will be given on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. The forenoons of these days will be devoted to writing and the afternoons will be allowed the teachers to look over papers.

### GENERAL SCHOOL NOTES.

A class of Eighth grade stenciling has been formed. The class meets with Miss George at the close of school on Fridays.

Seventh grade pupils throughout the school are pursuing a simple course in mechanical drawing. The instruction is given by Miss George.

Miss Griffin and Mrs. Woodbury of the North Bend schools spent Wednesday in Marshfield schools.

The pupils of Miss Megahan's room (Third grade) have been corresponding with the pupils of the same grade in the schools of Mason, Michigan. They were jubilant Friday over a new "batch" of letters just received.

During the past week recitations were given before the high school assembly by Chester Isaacson, Agnes Sanquist, May Myren, Albert Haines, May Blake, Catherine Carlisle, Myrtle Lund, Vivian Carlson, Eather Nelson, George Murch, Myrtle Cowan, George Vasey. This work constitutes part of the rhetorical work for the first half year.

In order to enable the members of the basket ball team to have a warm dinner before playing Myrtle Point, the noon hour being too short to permit some of the team to go home and get back in time for the afternoon session, dinner was served in the domestic science kitchen. The eatables were furnished by the high school faculty and the members of Miss Kaufman's high department cookery class did the preparing of the meal and the serving of it. The little affair appeared to be quite a success.

In speaking last week of the exhibit of school work that is being planned to be given in the spring it was our intention to say that the work shown would be a fair representation of daily work done throughout the school and not an attempt to make display. Our copy made us say something quite the contrary by the omission of the word "not."

The second half year will begin Monday, February 6th. Parents who are expecting to enter their children in school for the first time are requested to do so at that time. New classes will begin work in all grades on that day in accordance with the semi-annual promotion plan. Some new classes will also begin in the high school; there will be a class in solid geometry, another in Botany, and one in Roman History. The commercial department will take up some new work. Speaking of the work of the commercial department, we wonder sometimes whether young people of this city or their parents recognize the excellent opportunities offered right here at home for securing a good business course. Probably if the same thing were offered in Portland and cost several hundred dollars it would be worth considering. There are fifty young people right here in Marshfield who could not be better occupied than in taking the two year commercial course offered in our high school. It would increase their efficiency many times. Russel Conwell would wax eloquent on this subject and deliver an oration entitled "Acres of Diamonds" to impress upon us the fact that there is such a thing as having good things so close to one that they are entitled overlooked.
