**MORROW TALKS
BUSINESS MEN**

You have got to show that you have the commerce that justifies it and requires it more than the hundreds of other harbors that are making demands on Congress.

"When the officials begin the consideration of the harbors demanding appropriations of the government, the lack of the railroad has a great effect. When they see Coos Bay on the map or chart without the line designating railroad communication, there is a tendency to pass it up in favor of some other harbor. So I say to you, centralize your energies on securing a railroad. There may be opposition to a railroad, fearing it may dominate in a certain way in a community, but the benefits accruing from it to your harbor will more than offset any dominance any railroad could exert."

He urged greater cooperation among the people of Coos Bay and a more united effort and intimated that such instead of divisive strife over matters the energy so expended had better be centralized towards getting a railroad and improving the harbor.

He said that Coos Bay's wonderful resources were certain in time to bring the necessary recognition by the government of its harbor but without a railroad or a showing of traffic that will warrant it, much time must elapse no matter how favorable engineers or others may think of it or recommend.

As to cooperation, he pointed out that the interests on Coos Bay should contribute much towards the improvement of the bar and harbor. Speaking especially of one interest, he said that their holdings here should warrant their contributing approximately one-third towards the expense, and that if this was done, he said he had not fear but that the government would do the balance.
