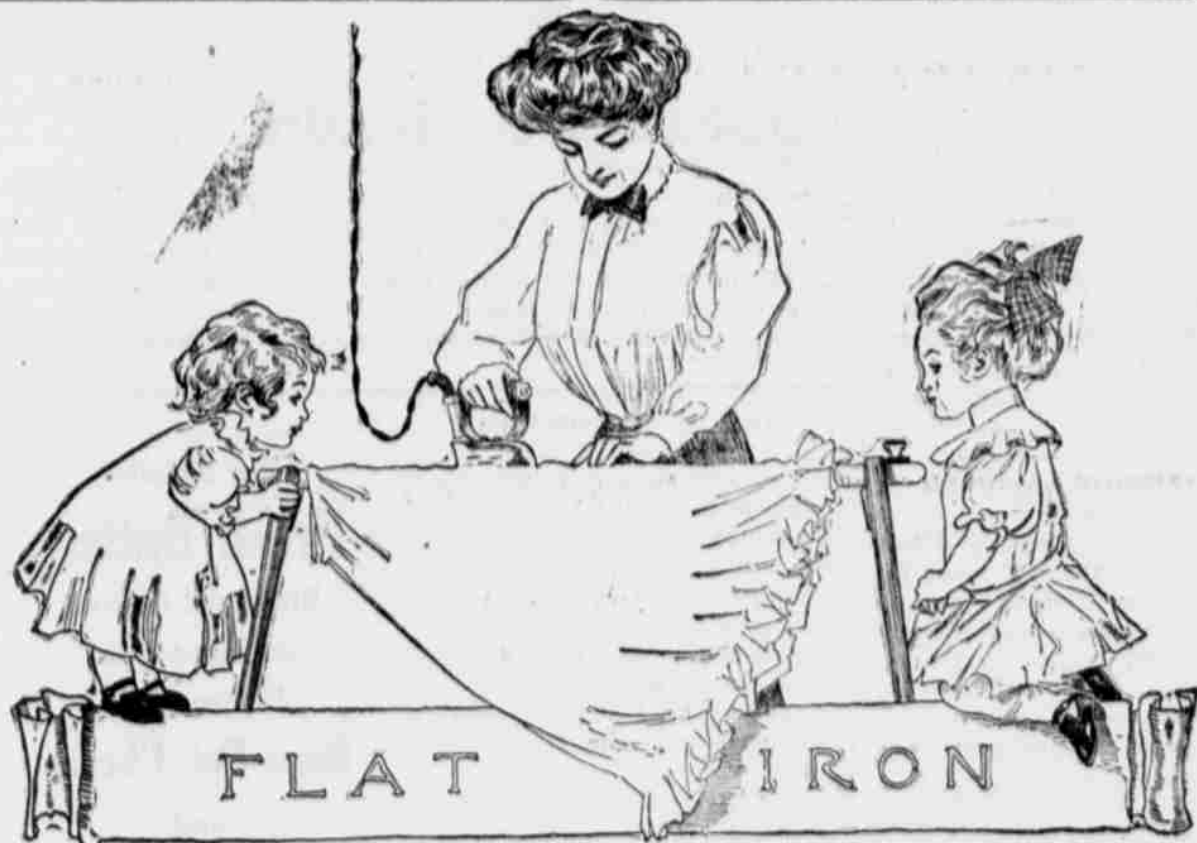

PEIRCE FATHERS BILL.

Wants Commercial Fishing On Lower Rogue River.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 30.—Fishing with nets and seines will be permitted in the Rogue river below the mouth of the Illinois river, if a bill introduced in the house by Representative Peirce of Coos and Curry becomes a law. However, fishing for steelheads anywhere in the Rogue river except with hook and line will be prohibited. This act is amendatory of the act adopted by the people last November prohibiting all fishing in the Rogue river except with hook and line.

It is contended by the cannerymen and fishermen established near the mouth of the Rogue river, where much commercial fishing for salmon has been carried on for years, that the act enacted by the people was highly detrimental to their investments, and for this reason the Peirce bill was introduced in the House. It is contended by the commercial fishing interests that prohibiting the catching of steelheads will give the upper river anglers sufficient sport, and only the larger fish, such as the full grown salmon, will be taken at the mouth of the river, the smaller trout and steelhead salmon being allowed to traverse the upper reaches of the stream. The mouth of the Illinois river is about 30 miles inland from the mouth of the Rogue river.

BEGINS ANOTHER SUIT.

Brother of J. O. Stemmler of Myrtle Point Sues Sanitarium.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 30.—Laurel A. Stemler filed suit for \$100,000 damages against the Crystal Springs Sanitarium Company in the Circuit Court. Stemler was a patient at the sanitarium from January 13, 1909, until October 6, 1910, and declares he was subjected to the most harrowing cruelty by attendants at the institution and that he came out a physical and nervous wreck.

Although Stemler says there were numerous occasions when he was beaten by attendants, he mentions in particular his alleged experience on October 6, 1910, when his two brothers called to see him at the sanitarium. On that day he says the attendants set upon him, wantonly and maliciously, and inflicted a merciless beating. He alleges that they imprisoned him in a room, fastened him so that he could not move a limb and gagged him, so that he was powerless to call for help. While they had him on the floor at their mercy, he declares that they beat him black and blue.
