HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.

The second half year's work will begin Monday, February 6th. Parents expecting to start their children in school for the first time this spring are asked to have them enter on the above date. New classes will be started at that time.

The Bandon-Marshfield debate will occur Friday evening, February 10th.
