### LEFT TO THE PEOPLE.

Whether or Not County Officials' Salaries Are Raised.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 6.—Various county officials throughout the state, who are seeking an increase in salary by legislative enactment, will have to go before the people if they are to get more pay.

That is the sentiment of the house committee on salaries of the state and county officers, to which all salary bills are referred. This committee, in the consideration of these measures, has established an inviolable rule to attach a referendum clause to every bill, giving to the voters of the county affected the right to invoke the referendum if a petition signed by 15 per cent of the legal voters is filed with the proper authorities within 90 days after the bill becomes a law.
